

The advisory group on climate change formed by Ban ki-Moon

New York (Reuters) – United Nations Secretary Ban ki-moon formed the recommended team on climate change. The group includes Mexico's Carlos Slim, India's Tata and other business person and executive from nongovernmental organization.

On Wednesday Lars Josefsson, the chief executive of Swedish power utility Vattenfall said to Reuters after the inaugural meeting of the group in New York. "Its goal is to be supportive for the secretary-general in his work to increase the likelihood of a deal in Copenhagen and also then afterwards the execution of the deal."

The meeting held at the end of the year in Denmark that almost 200 countries will try to beat out a descendant treaty to the U.N. Kyoto Protocol on global warming. The rich and poor are still in stalemate on how to reduce emanation. The poor countries want the rich countries require to have reduced greenhouse gases because they are responsible to produced most of the planet-warming gases. The developing nations and China want the rich nations to reduced 40 % below 1990 levels by 2020. The rich countries so far exercises to decrease between 8 and 14 % below 1990. The Ban's group endeavor to congregate every two months and to continue coming jointly after Copenhagen Josefsson said.

The groups also integrate Zhenrong Shi, chief executive of Chinese solar panel manufacturer Suntech Holdings Co Ltd and Leena Srivastava, the executive director of The Energy and Resources Institute, an Indian nonprofit. Tata is the chairman of Tata Motors. Billionaire Slim controls Telemex.
